For Square Measure the square of long measure is used. For measuring land—in the place of acre—the **centar** which is one square meter, equivalent to 1,550 square inches; the **ar** which is 100 square meters, equivalent to 119.6 square yards; the **hectar** which is 10,000 square meters, equivalent to 2,471.4 acres, are used.

For Cubic Measure the cube of long measure is used; **ster** is used as a measure of wood in place of cord. The mill, cent, dime, dollar, and eagle of U. S. money exactly illustrate the decimal system of the metric measures,—the mill, cent, dime, corresponding with the mill, centi, deci of the metric system.

Abbreviations.—For meter, liter, and gram, the small initial letter is used, viz: m. l. g.; each division deci, centi, milli, also is abbreviated by using the small initial letters d. c. m.; but each multiple, deka, hekto, kilo, myria, is abbreviated by using the capital initial letter D. H. K. M.

Equivalents.—1 inch equals .0254 meter, or about 2 1-2 centimeters; 1 foot equals .3048 meter, or about 30 centimeters; 1 yard equals .9144 meter, or ab. 10-11 of a meter; 1 mile 1609 meters, or ab. 1.6 kilometers.

1 U. S. liquid quart equals .946 liter, or a little less than 1 liter; 1 U. S. dry quart equals 1.101 liters; 1 U. S. gallon equals 3.785 liters, or about 3.8 liters; 1 U. S. bushel equals 35.24 liters, or about 4-11 of a hektoliter.

1 avoirdupois ounce equals .02835 kilogram, or a little less than 30 grams; 1 Troy and apothecaries ounce equals .03110 kilogram, or a little more than 30 grams; 1 avoirdupois pound equals .45359 kilogram, or about 5-11 of a kilogram; 1 long ton—2240 pounds—equals 1016.05 kilograms, or about 1 metric ton.

Basis of the system.—1. The unit of length, the meter, is the ten millionth part of a quadrant of the meridian of Paris, being 39.37 inches, nearly. 2. The unit of surface, the ar, is the square of ten meters, or a hundred square meters. 3. The unit of capacity, the liter, is a cube whose edge is a tenth of a meter. 4. The unit of weight, the gram, is the weight of a cube of rain-water, whose edge is an hundredth of a meter. From these four primary units all others are derived according to the decimal scale.

Where used.—The system is adopted by the following countries: in exclusive use in France, Germany, Austria, Belgium, Holland, Italy, Spain, Portugal, Norway, Switzerland, Roumania, Brazil; in partial use in Denmark, Greece, Argentine Confederation, Venezuela; legalized, but not in general use, in the United States, Great Britain, Russia, Norway, Sweden, Turkey, Mexico, Chili, Costa Rica, Ecuador, Peru, U. S. of Columbia, Uruguay. In Sweden compulsory law will take effect in 1889.

The telegraph was constructed at a cost of \$12,000, and was accepted by the city, March, 1869. Alarm is given instantly from the Alarm Boxes to the office of the Fire Department, to each of the Engine Houses, to City Hall, to the Arcade, to the Water Works building, and to the residences of the Chief Engineer and Fire Marshal, the number of taps indicating the box from which the alarm is given. The taps can also be heard at each of the other boxes. Keys to the boxes are in the hands of the police and the nearest responsible resident.

The bell on the City Hall is struck daily at 12 M. by telegraph.

Ten strokes are given for a general Fire Alarm.

Nine strokes are given to rally the Police.

Two strokes are given, on City Hall bell only, when fires are out.

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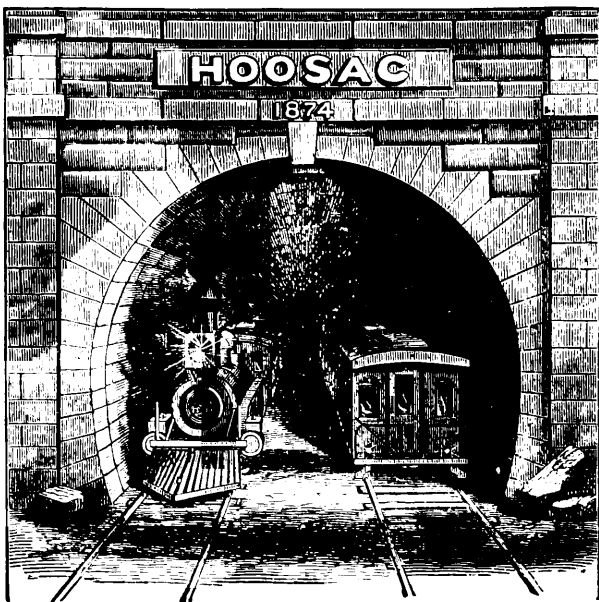

This body was incorporated for the purpose of taking charge of certain moneys assessed by law upon all fire insurance companies outside of the State doing business in Rochester. The interest accruing on money so received is devoted to the relief of indigent, disabled firemen and their families. This fund amounts to \$45,578 10, yielding an annual income of about \$2,500.

PENAL ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER.

CHAPTER I.

RELATING TO NUISANCES.

Passed November 11th, 1862.

The Common Council of the City of Rochester do ordain as follows :

SECTION 1. No person shall make, aid, countenance, or assist in making any **noise, disturbance**, or improper diversion in any of the streets, public squares, lanes or alleys, in the city of Rochester, nor shall any assemblage or crowd of persons collect in such streets, public squares, lanes or alleys, or on any of the bridges, to the annoyance or disturbance of any of the citizens or others, under a penalty of TEN DOLLARS for each offence.

No person shall sound any **gong** in the street, or in any alley, upon any sidewalk, or upon any piazza, balcony steps or platform, adjoining any sidewalk or street in the city of Rochester, under a penalty of TEN DOLLARS for each offence.

No tenant or occupant of any dwelling shall suffer or permit any **gong** to be sounded upon any street, alley or sidewalk, or upon any piazza, balcony, stoop, step or platform, adjoining any street or sidewalk in said city, under a penalty of TEN DOLLARS for each offence.

§ 2. No person shall **drive or ride**, or cause or suffer to be rode or driven, any horse, mare, gelding or other animal, in or through any public street, lane or alley of said city, at a speed exceeding six miles an hour, under a penalty of TEN DOLLARS for each offence.

§ 3. No person or persons shall **ride or drive**, or cause to be rode or driven any horse, mare, gelding or other animal, upon or over any of the bridges within said city, except Main and Buffalo street bridge ; or over the cross-walk at any corner of a street, lane or alley, faster than a walk, under a penalty of FIVE DOLLARS for each offence.

§ 4. No person shall leave any horse, mare, gelding or other animal standing in any public street or alley, within said city, without being well secured, **tied or fastened**, under a penalty of FIVE DOLLARS for each offence.

§ 5. No person shall throw or deposit any straw, shavings, lime, ashes, refuse coal, scraps, slops, **dirt or rubbish** of any description, or the contents of any bed, into or upon any street, park, lane or alley in the said city, under a penalty of TWO DOLLARS for each offence.

§ 6. No person shall deposit, or cause to be deposited, any dead animal, fish, or putrid meat, entrails, shells of oysters or clams, decayed fruit or vegetables, or any other filthy or **offensive substance**, in or upon any **public street**, lane, park or alley, or on the surface of the ground in any lot, or in any canal, or any basin attached thereto, or in the Genesee river except as hereinafter provided, or in any mill-race, or on any bank thereof of said city, or suffer or permit any stagnant or filthy water, or putrid or unwholesome meats, decayed fruits or vegetables, or other filthy or offensive substance, to remain on his or her lot, or in his or her house, or other building or cellar, or in or upon any boat in any canal, or in the Genesee river, within the limits of this city, under a penalty of TWENTY-FIVE DOLLARS for each offence, and the expense and charge which the said corporation shall incur in removing or abating such nuisance.

The police Justice, or any Alderman, Superintendent of Streets, or any person authorized by them, or either of them, or any policeman, may at any time enter into or upon any house, cellar, boat, lot or other place, and remove or abate such **nuisance** in such manner as shall be judged best. And every person obstructing or hindering such removal or abatement shall forfeit and pay a penalty of TWENTY-FIVE DOLLARS for each offence.

§ 7. No person shall fly a kite within the said city under a penalty of TWO DOLLARS for each offence.

§ 8. No person shall, under a penalty of TWENTY-FIVE DOLLARS for each offence, sell, or keep, or expose for sale, any gundowder, or India or China or other fire crackers, rockets, or other preparations from **gunpowder**, **without license** therefor from the common council. And the Mayor of said city, or any Alderman, or the City Superintendent, is hereby authorized to enter upon the premises where the same are kept, and to seize or destroy or otherwise dispose of the same.

§ 9. No person shall fire or set off any gunpowder, cracker, squib or rocket, or **firework**, or fire any pistol, gun or cannon, or throw any fire ball, or make any bon-fire, or aid or abet therein, in any part of said city, under a penalty of FIVE DOLLARS for each offence. But this section may be suspended in any particular and as to any person, in the discretion of the Mayor.

§ 10. No person shall cast or throw any **hide or skin**, tanned or not tanned, out of any door or window of any building, above the first story, fronting on any street, or cause any such untanned hide to be suspended from, or laid on any post or elsewhere, in any street of such city, under a penalty of TWO DOLLARS for each offence.

§ 11. It shall be lawful for any person to **bathe or swim** in the Genesee river, or in the Erie or Genesee Valley canals within the city of Rochester, provided such persons wear tights, pants or shirts.

§ 12. No person shall keep a **nine-pin or bowling alley**, or billiard table, within said city, without a license therefor from the common council, under a penalty of TEN DOLLARS for each and every day the same shall be so kept.

§ 13. No person keeping an alley commonly called a **nine-pin alley, bowling alley or billiard table**, within the city, shall permit any game to be played thereon after ten o'clock in the evening, or before eight o'clock in the morning; nor shall any such person suffer or permit any minor or apprentice to play at said alley or table at any time whatever, under a penalty of FIVE DOLLARS for each offence.

§ 14. Any person who shall keep a **disorderly house**, or a gaming house, or a room or rooms within this city for either or both of these purposes, shall, upon conviction therefor, pay a penalty of not less than FIFTY DOLLARS.

Any person who shall have or keep a house, building or place in the city in which any e. o. table, keno table, faro bank, shuffle board, bagatelle, playing cards, or any instrument, device or thing employed for **gambling**, shall, by or with the consent or permission of such person, his agents or servants, be kept or used, whereon or with which money shall in any manner be played for, shall be subject to a fine of not less than FIFTY DOLLARS.

Any person who shall play for liquor, beer, cider, or other article, or permit the same to be played for, as above stated, shall be subject to a fine of not less than FIVE nor more than FIFTY DOLLARS.

Any owner or keeper, or any person within such disorderly or gambling house, room or rooms, building or place, who shall refuse to permit the Mayor, any Alderman, the Police Justice, Chief of Police, or any policeman to enter the same, or shall **obstruct or resist** the aforesaid officers (or persons summoned by them to assist) in entering such place, or in the **destruction of any instruments or devices** employed in gambling in such places, shall be subject to a fine of not less than TEN nor more than ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS.

§ 15. No person shall cut, **injure, deface or tarnish**, any public building, bridge, street sign, or any property belonging to the corporation; nor any well, pump, fence, tree, awning, useful or ornamental improvement, or public work in said city; nor break any window or window glass in any private or public building, or place of worship; nor aid, abet, or assist therein, under a penalty of TEN DOLLARS for each offence.

§ 16. No boat **bell** shall be rung, nor shall any **signal horn**, trumpet, or other instrument, be blown or played for a signal within said city on Sunday, nor shall any bell connected with or used for any railroad depot, be rung within said city on Sunday, under a penalty of FIVE DOLLARS for each offence.

§ 17. No person shall **post any bill or card** or advertisement on any building or fence in said city, without leave from the owner or occupant, nor upon any public bridge, under a penalty of FIVE DOLLARS for each offence.

No person shall carry, or procure to be carried, any sign, bill, card or advertisement, for the purpose of advertising any business, profession, trade, place of amusement, or occupation, through or upon any of the streets or sidewalks of said city, under a penalty of FIVE DOLLARS for each offence.

§ 18. No person shall **solicit alms** within said city, without the written permission of the Mayor, nor after thirty days from the date of said permission, or the granting of the same, which written permission shall be presented and shown at the time of soliciting, under a penalty of TWO DOLLARS for the first offence, and FIVE DOLLARS for every subsequent offence.

§ 19. No runner, stage driver or other person, shall **solicit passengers**, travelers, or other persons, in any of the public streets, railroad depots, or public places, or on any wharf, or on board of any boat or stage, within said city, for any railroad car, boat, stage or carriage, or for any public inn or tavern, under a penalty of FIVE DOLLARS for each offence.

§ 20. No owner or possessor of any swine, horses, sheep, goats, cows, or other **cattle**, shall suffer any such animal or animals to run or to be at large in any of the public streets, lanes, alleys, or parks within said city, under the penalty of ONE DOLLAR for each animal so running or being at large.

§ 21. No owner or possessor of any **goose or geese, ducks**, or other fowls, shall suffer any such fowl to run or to be at large in any of the public streets,

lanes, alleys, or squares within said city, under a penalty of TWENTY-FIVE CENTS for each fowl, &c., so running or being at large.

§ 22. No dog shall be permitted to go abroad in any of the streets, squares, lanes, alleys or public places in this city, without being led and securely confined by a chain or string, or properly muzzled, under a penalty of TEN DOLLARS for each offence, to be recovered against the owner or possessor of such dog, or the person who harbored such dog within two days previous to the time of such dog being found so going abroad.

§ 24. No person or company of persons shall exhibit or perform for gain or profit, any **theatrical or circus** representations or exhibitions, or any paintings, animal or animals, or other natural or artificial curiosity, or any puppet show, wire or rope dance, or any other idle show, acts or feats which common showmen, mountebanks or jugglers usually practice or perform, or any concert, musical entertainments, exhibition or dances, or series of lectures for private emolument or gain, without having obtained a **license** for the same from the common council of said city; and no owner or occupant of any house, outhouse, yard or other place, shall furnish or allow the same to be used for the accommodation of such exhibition or performance, unless such license be obtained as aforesaid, under a penalty of FIFTY DOLLARS for each offence.

§ 25. The Mayor or other officers for the time being exercising the duties of the office of Mayor, may, whenever an application cannot in the first instance be made to the common council, grant **licenses** for public shows and exhibitions, on the payment into the treasury of such sums as the Mayor or said officer shall direct; such license to be valid until the next ensuing meeting of the common council.

§ 26. No person shall construct or cause to be constructed within the said city, any **vault** to be used for the purpose of a **privy**, without special permission from the board of health, Mayor, or Health Physician, under a penalty of FIFTY DOLLARS for each offence.

§ 27. Every resident owner of every inhabited lot in said city, and the occupant of every such lot, when the owner thereof is a non-resident, shall provide and keep upon such lot a convenient **privy**, with a vault at least four feet deep, under a penalty of FIVE DOLLARS for every twenty four hours any violation of this ordinance shall be continued.

§ 28. All owners and keeper of **hotels, taverns**, boarding houses, factories, arcades, warehouses and establishments where more than ten persons are habitually gathered or employed, within the said city, shall cause to be constructed on their respective premises, one or more strong wooden boxes, slides or drawers, of suitable dimensions, provided with a convenient handle at each end, and with moveable lids, which may be fitted thereto perfectly tight; and shall cause such boxes to be placed under the seats of their respective privies, as a substitute for vaults now in use; and shall cause such boxes to be carried away and emptied by licensed scavengers, into places to be designated by the Mayor or board of health, and washed out perfectly clean, and again replaced at least once in each week, from the first day of May to the first day of October in each year, or oftener, as the board of health shall direct, under a penalty of FIFTY DOLLARS for each offence.

§ 29. No person shall, under the penalty of FIFTY DOLLARS for each offence, empty or deposit the contents of any tub or receptacle out of any privy, vault or cess pool into any street, alley, canal or public square, or into the river, except at places designated therefor by the Mayor or board of health.

§ 30. No person shall build or cause to be built, a **privy** on or near the **bank of any canal**, or on or near the bank of any basin or slip, within said city, in such manner as that the same shall communicate with said canal, basin or slip; and all owners and occupants of privies already built in such manner, shall not use such privies except with boxes, slides or drawers, as described in the twenty-eighth section of this ordinance, under a penalty of FIFTY DOLLARS for each offence.

Nothing herein contained shall apply in any manner to any privy, the contents of which are carried into any sewer of ample dimensions, and washed out by a suitable supply of water.

§ 31. It shall be the duty of the **City Superintendent**, or such other persons as may be specially authorized for that purpose by the Board of Health (and such Superintendent or person so authorized shall have power) to enter into and upon, and **examine** any lot, yard, building, cellar, alley, basin, slip, sink, drain, vault or privy, or any other place within the limits of the said city of Rochester; and if the same shall be found to be foul, incumbered with rubbish, damp, sunken or ill-constructed, or to contain any filth or other offensive substance or nuisance, to direct the removal of all such nuisance, filth, other

offensive substance, or the cleansing or repairing of any drain, vault or privy, upon any such lot of ground or premises, by the owner or agent of the owner, lessor, lessee, or occupant of the same within twenty-four hours after such directions from such Superintendents or other person. Any person who shall refuse or neglect to comply with such directions after such notice as aforesaid, shall forfeit and pay a penalty of TWENTY-FIVE DOLLARS for each offence.

§ 32. No person shall place or post, or cause or permit to be placed or posted, in any street or on any bridge in said city, any **handbill or advertisement** giving notice that any person has, or professes to have skill in the treatment or curing of any disorders, **disease**, or giving notice of the sale or exposure to sale of any nostrum or medicine, under the penalty of TEN DOLLARS for each offence.

§ 33. The Mayor may from time to time license such and so many persons as he shall deem proper, who shall be the **scavengers** of said city, whose licenses shall expire on the first day of July next after the same shall be granted.

Such scavengers shall execute a bond to the city of Rochester in the penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars for the faithful performance of their duty and under the regulations prescribed by the Board of Health.

From and after the first day of July, 1876, the contents of any privy vault, box, drawer or cess pool, shall not be removed, except in air and water tight receptacles, and in the manner and by such apparatus as shall be prescribed by the Board of Health of the city of Rochester, under a penalty of TWENTY-FIVE DOLLARS for each offence.

§ 34. Every execution issued upon a judgment recovered for a **violation** of any and all of the preceding sections of the **ordinance**, shall command the amount to be made of the property of the defendant, if any such can be found, and if not, then to commit the defendant to the Monroe county penitentiary for the period of not less than TEN nor more than THIRTY DAYS.

§ 35. Any person who shall be guilty of keeping or maintaining, or be an inmate of, or in any way connected with, or any way contribute to the support of any disorderly house or **house of ill-fame**, or place for the practice of fornication, or knowingly own or be interested as proprietor or landlord of any such house, shall, on conviction for the same, be liable to be fined in any sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS, and in default of payment of the penalty imposed, shall be imprisoned in the Monroe county penitentiary, or county jail, for any period not exceeding ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY DAYS.

§ 36. Any female who shall be convicted of being an inmate of any house of ill-fame, or place for the practice of fornication, or shall be found loitering or strolling about the streets of the city, by day or night, without any regular lawful business, or who shall be convicted of being a prostitute, shall be subject to a penalty in a sum of money of not less than TEN nor more than FIFTY DOLLARS, and in default of payment or recovery of such penalty imposed, shall be subject to imprisonment in the Monroe county penitentiary for a term not exceeding THREE MONTHS.

§ 37. The Mayor, Police Justice, Chief of Police, any alderman or policeman, or persons summoned by them, or by any of them, to aid them, may enter any disorderly house, **house of ill-fame**, house of prostitution or assignation, or **gambling house**, or room, and arrest, with or without a warrant, any suspicious persons found therein, and destroy any instruments or devices employed in gaming in such places; and if admission be refused, may enter by force, by breaking the doors or otherwise.

§ 38. Any person who shall, within the city, appear in a state of nudity, or in a dress not belonging to his or her sex, or in an **indecent or lewd dress**, or make an indecent exposure of his or her person, or shall sell, or offer to sell, any indecent or lewd book, picture or other thing, or shall exhibit or perform any indecent or immoral play, or other representation, shall be subject to a fine of not less than FIFTEEN DOLLARS, and in default of the payment of the penalty or fine imposed, shall be subject to such term of imprisonment in the Monroe county penitentiary, not exceeding THREE MONTHS, as the magistrate shall deem proper.

§ 39. Any person who shall be drunk, or shall be in a state of **intoxication**, in any highway, street, alley or public place in the city, or in any private house or place, to the annoyance of any person or citizens, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding TEN DOLLARS, and in default of the payment of the fine or penalty imposed, shall be subject to imprisonment in the penitentiary not less than TEN DAYS nor more than THREE MONTHS.

§ 40. No person or persons, without the permission of the owner, shall molest, **drive away** or take from any of the public streets of the city of Roch-

ester any horse, mare, or gelding, belonging to another person; and any person or persons who shall so molest, drive away, take, or use any horse, mare or gelding, shall, upon conviction, be sentenced to the Monroe county penitentiary for a period of not less than THIRTY DAYS.

§ 41. No person shall carry on, within the city of Rochester, any business or **manufactory** of such a character, or in such a manner, as shall produce or cause such a dense smoke, or such loud and disturbing noises as to be a nuisance; nor shall any person in the process of any manufactory or business, or in any manner cause to be set afloat in the air, or scattered and deposited upon any houses or lands within the city, cinders or soot so as to be a nuisance; and no person shall carry on any manufactory or business in said city, of such character, or in such a manner as shall cause or produce disturbing noises in any of the streets of the city. Every person who shall violate or offend against any provision of this section, shall forfeit and pay a penalty of FIFTY DOLLARS, and the further penalty of FIFTY DOLLARS for every day that such offence shall continue after notice from any city officer to the offender, to discontinue the same; but every manufactory or business already established, and now actually in operation or carried on, shall be excepted from the operation of this act.

§ 42. Every execution issued upon a judgment recovered for a violation of this ordinance, or any provision thereof, except as herein otherwise provided, shall command the amount to be made of the property of the defendant, if any such can be found, and if not, then to commit the defendant to the Monroe county penitentiary for a period not exceeding TWENTY DAYS.

CHAPTER III.

HACKNEY COACHES AND CARRIAGES.

Passed June 10th, 1868.

The Common Council of the City of Rochester do ordain as follows: extract—

SECTION 6. Hackney coaches, cabs or carriages, **waiting for employment** shall at all times stand, Sundays excepted, on the south side of W. Main street, from Irving place to Fitzhugh street, with the horses' heads towards the east, and on the west side of Irving place from W. Main street to the south gate of Court House lawn; and on the east side of Fitzhugh street from W. Main street to said south gate, with the horses' heads towards the north; and on Front street from Mumford street to the N. Y. Central Railroad depot, with the horses' heads towards the south; on the east side of Exchange, opposite the Genesee Valley depot; and on the south side of Main street from the west bank of the Genesee river to the east bank thereof, with the horses' heads towards the east; or at such other place or places as the Mayor, under the direction of the common council, may designate, and not elsewhere, under the penalty of FIVE DOLLARS for each offence, to be sued for and recovered from the owner or driver thereof, severally and respectively.

§ 8. The prices or rates of fare to be taken or paid to the owner or drivers of hackney coaches, cabs or carriages, shall be as follows, to-wit:

1st. For conveying a passenger within the limits herein described as territory No. 1; and which is designated on the map as territory included within the red lines thereon, FIFTY CENTS.

2d. For conveying a passenger from any point within the blue lines or territory herein described as No. 2, to any point outside of the limits of territory No. 1; and within the limits herein described as territory No. 2, and which is designated on the map as territory included within the blue lines, and between the red and blue thereon, SEVENTY-FIVE CENTS.

3d. For conveying a passenger from any point within the limits of the city to any point outside the limits of territory No. 2, and within the limits herein described as territory No. 3, and which is designated on the map as territory included within the city lines, and between the blue and city lines thereon, ONE DOLLAR.

4th. For each additional passenger, TWENTY-FIVE CENTS.

5th. Half-fare shall be allowed for returning to place of starting, provided there is a detention of not longer than fifteen minutes; when over that full fare.

6th. For conveying a pleasure party to Mt. Hope and return, THREE DOLLARS—one hour being allowed at the grounds.

7th. For the use of a hackney coach, cab or carriage by the hour, to the extent of the capacity of the vehicle, ONE DOLLAR AND FIFTY CENTS, and the same proportion for fractional parts of an hour.

8th. For attending a funeral with passengers, including charges for necessary detention and returning with passengers from house, THREE DOLLARS.

9th. For children between eight and twelve years of age, half price only to

be charged, and for children under eight years of age, no charge is to be made.

10th. A sum exceeding ten dollars shall not be demanded for the use of any hackney coach, cab or carriage in carrying persons to and from the polls on election day.

11th In case of a dispute or disagreement between the driver of any hackney coach, cab or carriage, and the hirer or occupant thereof, when demanded, said driver shall drive to the nearest policeman, who shall decide the matter, and no charge shall be made for the extra drive or ride.

Territory No. 1, for which fifty cents is to be charged; extends on N. St. Paul street to Gorham; on N. Clinton st. to Ward; on North st. to Hudson; on Scio to Tappan; on E. Main st. to University av.; on East av. to Union; on Monroe av. to Union; on Broadway to Alexander: on South av. to Alexander; on Mt. Hope av. to Alexander: on Exchange st. to Glasgow; on Plymouth av. to Glasgow; on Caledonia av. to Glasgow; on Reynolds st. to Hunter; on West av. to Reynolds; on Brown st. to Maple; on Magne st. to Grape, and on State st. to Lyell.

Territory No. 2, for which seventy-five cents is to be charged, lies outside of Territory No. 1, and extends on N. St. Paul st. to Lowell; on Clinton st. to Lowell; on North st. to Woodbury; on Scio st. to Lewis; on E. Main st. to Prince; on University av. to Prince; on East av. to Meigs; on Monroe av. to Meigs; on Broadway to Meigs; on South av. to Gregory; on Mt. Hope av. to Clarissa; on Exchange to Clarissa; on Plymouth av. to Bartlett; on Frances st. to Bartlett; on Genesee st. to Champlain; on West av. to Brown; on Brown st. to West av.; on Orange st. to Orchard; on Lyell st. to Orchard; and on Lake av. to Jones av.

Territory No. 3 embraces all of the city outside of Territory No. 2.

§ 9. No owner or driver of any hackney coach, cab or carriage in the city of Rochester, shall ask, demand or receive any larger sum than he or they may be entitled to receive as aforesaid, under the penalty of TEN DOLLARS for every such offence, to be sued for and recovered from the owner or owners or the driver of any such coaches, cabs or carriages, severally and respectively; and no such owner or driver shall demand, or receive from any such person or passenger, any extra compensation, or any sum whatever, for carrying and transporting with such person or passenger, in or upon such hackney coach, cab or carriage, any ordinary luggage belonging to any such person or passenger, to or from any of the points or distances above mentioned.

§ 10. The number of the license of every hackney coach, cab or carriage shall be painted in legible characters on the outside thereof, or on the lamps, and a printed copy of the map describing the territory, and of the different rates of fare to be charged, together with section eight of this ordinance, shall be framed and hung up in some conspicuous place in the inside of such coach, cab or carriage, under a penalty of TEN DOLLARS for each offence, to be sued for and recovered from the owner or driver of such hackney coach, cab or carriage, severally and respectively.

Every driver of a hackney coach, cab or carriage, licensed as hereinbefore provided, shall on each and every occasion, when his carriage shall be hired, deliver to the hirer thereof a card, with the name of the owner, the driver, and the number of the hack thereon, under a penalty of FIVE DOLLARS for each offence, to be sued for and recovered in the manner herein provided.

§ 12. No owner or driver of any hackney coach, cab or carriage, while on the stand heretofore designated, or whilst waiting for employment at any place other than the house or stable of the owner thereof, between the hours of sunrise and ten o'clock in the evening, shall refuse and neglect to convey any person or persons to any place or places within the limits of the city, upon being applied to for that purpose, and upon being tendered the fare for the same, under a penalty of FIVE DOLLARS for every such refusal or neglect, to be sued for and recovered of the owner or driver of any such hackney coach, cab or carriage, severally and respectively.

CITY BOUNDARIES.

Established by an act to amend the charter of the city of Rochester and to extend its boundaries. Passed May 9, 1874. Extract:

SECTION 2. The boundaries of the said city shall be as follows: Beginning at a point in the present town of Irondequoit, at a point in the middle of the ridge road, eight chains and seventy-five links distant from the top of the east bank of the Genesee river; thence south fifteen minutes east to the south line of the highway known as Norton street; thence easterly along the south line of the highway, running through the north-easterly corner of lot number forty-eight in said town; thence south-easterly along the westerly

line of said highway to the south line of lot number fifty in said town, where the same intersects the west line of the highway commonly called the Schenck or Culver road; thence southerly along the west line of said highway and in said line produced to the north line of lot number forty-five in the town of Brighton; thence westerly along the north line of lot number forty-five, and in said line produced to the east line of lot number sixty-one; thence southerly along the east line of said lot to the intersection thereof with the south line of the Pinnacle road; thence westerly along the south line of said road to the highway known as South avenue; thence southerly along the east line of said avenue to the south line of lot number twenty-three in the town of Brighton; thence westerly on a line in continuation of the south line of said lot number twenty-three, produced to the west bank of the Genesee; thence northerly along the west bank of said river to the south line of the town of Gates; thence westerly along the south line of the town of Gates, to a point on the south line of lot forty-six in said town, which would intersect the east line of lots seventy-five, seventy-six and one hundred and sixty-eight in said town of Gates, if produced southerly to the south line of the said town; thence northerly on the east line of lots seventy-five, seventy-six and one hundred and sixty-eight, produced to the south line of lot number twenty-two in said town; thence westerly on the south line of lot twenty-two to the east line of the highway; thence northerly on the east line of said highway to the north line of lot twenty-two; thence easterly on the north line of lot twenty-two to a point intersected by the east line of lot number one hundred and sixty-eight produced southerly; thence northerly on the east line of lot number one hundred and sixty-eight produced south, to the east line of lot one hundred and sixty-eight, and along the east lines of lots one hundred and sixty-eight, seventy-six, seventy-five, seventy-four and seventy-three, in the town of Gates, continued on the east line of lots seventy-two, seventy-one and seventy in the town of Greece, to a point twenty rods north of the center of the highway in the town of Greece, known as the Big Ridge road; thence easterly in a line parallel with the center of said road and twenty rods distant northerly therefrom, and on said line produced to the top of the east high bank of the Genesee river; thence southerly on the top of said bank to a point due west from the place of beginning; thence easterly to the place of beginning.

WARD BOUNDARIES AND ELECTION DISTRICTS.

Ward 1.—Beginning at a point in the centre of the Genesee river and of the Erie canal; thence running westerly along the centre of the Erie canal to the centre of Allen street; thence easterly along the centre of Allen street to the centre of State street; thence southerly along the centre of State street to the centre of Mumford street; thence easterly along the centre of Mumford street to the centre of the Genesee river; thence southerly along the centre of the Genesee river to the place of beginning.

Ward 2.—Beginning at a point in the centre of the Genesee river and of Mumford street; thence running westerly along the centre of Mumford street to the centre of State street; thence northerly along the centre of State street to the centre of Allen street; thence westerly along the centre of Allen street to the centre of the Erie canal; thence northerly along the centre of the Erie canal to the centre of Jay street; thence easterly along the centre of Jay street and the centre line thereof continued easterly to the centre of the Genesee river; thence southerly along the centre of the Genesee river to the place of beginning.

Ward 3.—Beginning at a point in the centre of the Genesee river and of the Erie canal; thence running westerly along the centre of the Erie canal to the centre of the Genesee Valley canal; thence southerly along the centre of the Genesee Valley canal to the south line of the Strong tract; thence along the south line of the Strong tract to the centre of the Genesee river; thence northerly along the centre of the Genesee river to the place of beginning.

Election District, No. 1, comprises all that part of the ward lying north of a line drawn through the centre of Atkinson street, west of a line drawn through the centre of Plymouth avenue from Atkinson street to Troup street, and north of a line drawn through the centre of Troup street from Plymouth avenue to Exchange street.

Election District, No. 2, comprises all that part of the ward lying south of a line drawn through the centre of Atkinson street, east of a line drawn through the centre of Plymouth avenue from Atkinson street to Troup street, and south of a line drawn through the centre of Troup street from Plymouth avenue to Exchange street.

Ward 4.—Beginning at a point in the centre of the Genesee river and of

East Main street; thence running easterly along the centre of East Main street to the centre of East avenue; thence along the centre of East avenue to the centre of William street; thence southerly along the centre of William street to the centre of Howell street; thence westerly along the centre of Howell street, and the centre line thereof continued westerly, to the centre of the Genesee river; thence northerly along the centre of the Genesee river to the place of beginning.

Ward 5.—Beginning at a point in the centre of East Main street and of the Genesee river; thence running northerly along the centre of the Genesee river to the north boundary* of the city; thence easterly and southerly along the boundary line of the city to the centre of Clinton street; thence southerly along the centre of Clinton street to the centre of East Main street; thence westerly along the centre of East Main street to the place of beginning.

Election District, No. 1 comprises all that part of the ward lying south of a line drawn through the centre of Gorham street.

Election District, No. 2 comprises all that part of the ward lying north of a line drawn through the centre of Gorham street.

Ward 6.—Beginning at a point in the centre of North street and of the New York Central Railroad track; running thence westerly along the centre of said railroad track to a point in a line with the centre of Nassau street; thence westerly along the centre of Nassau street and in a direct line continued to the centre of Clinton street; thence southerly along the centre of Clinton street to the centre of East Main street; thence easterly along the centre of East Main street to the centre of North street; thence northerly along the centre of North street to the place of beginning.

Ward 7.—Beginning at a point in the centre of East avenue and of William street; thence running southerly along the centre of William street to the centre of Howell street; thence westerly along the centre of Howell street, and the centre line of Howell street continued westerly, to the centre of the Erie canal; thence easterly along the centre of the Erie canal to the east boundary line* of the city; thence northerly along the boundary line of the city to the centre of East avenue; thence westerly along the centre of East avenue to the place of beginning.

Election District, No. 1 comprises all that part of the ward lying west of a line drawn through the centre of Alexander street from Erie canal to Pearl street, south-west of a line drawn through the centre of Pearl from Alexander to South Union and west of a line drawn through the centre of South Union street.

Election District, No. 2 comprises all that part of the ward lying east of a line drawn through the centre of Alexander street from the Erie canal to Pearl street, north-east of a line drawn through the centre of Pearl from Alexander street, South Union street and east of a line drawn through the centre of South Union street.

Ward 8.—Beginning at a point in the centre of Brown street and of the Erie canal; thence running southerly along the centre of the Erie canal to the centre of the Genesee Valley canal; thence southerly along the centre of the Genesee Valley canal to the south line of the Strong tract; thence easterly along the south line of the Strong tract to the centre of the Genesee river; thence southerly along the centre of the Genesee river to the south boundary line* of the city; thence westerly and northerly along the boundary line of the city to the centre of West avenue; thence easterly along the centre of West avenue to the centre of Brown street; thence easterly along the centre of Brown street to the place of beginning.

Election District, No. 1 comprises all of that part of the ward lying north of a line drawn through the centre of Hunter street.

Election District, No. 2 comprises all of that part of the ward lying south of a line drawn through the centre of Hunter street.

Ward 9.—Beginning at a point in the centre of Jay street and of the Erie canal, and running thence easterly along the centre of Jay street, and Jay street continued, to the centre of the Genesee river; thence northerly along the centre of the Genesee river to the north boundary* of the city; thence westerly and southerly along the boundary* of the city to the centre of the Erie canal; thence south-easterly along the centre of the Erie canal to the place of beginning.

Election District, No. 1, comprises all of that part of the ward lying south of a line drawn through the centre of Lorimer street.

Election District, No. 2, comprises all of that part of the ward lying north of a line drawn through the centre of Lorimer street.

Ward 10.—Beginning at a point in the centre of East Main and of North Streets; thence running easterly along the centre of East Main street and East

avenue to the east boundary line of the city; thence northerly and westerly along the east and north boundary line of the city to a point in a line with the centre line of Scio street continued northerly; thence southerly through the centre of Scio street to the centre of East Main street; thence westerly along the centre of East Main street to the place of beginning.

Ward 11.—Beginning at a point in the centre of Brown street and of the Erie canal and running thence along the centre of the Erie canal north-westerly to the west boundary* of the city; thence southerly along the west boundary to the centre of West avenue; thence easterly along the centre of West avenue to the centre of Brown street; thence easterly along the centre of Brown street to the place of beginning.

Election District, No. 1, comprises all that part of the ward lying south of a line drawn through the centre of Campbell, east of a line drawn through the centre of Grape from Campbell street to Jay street, and south of a line drawn through the centre of Jay street from Grape street to the Erie canal.

Election District, No. 2, comprises all that part of the ward lying north of a line drawn through the centre of Campbell street west of a line drawn through the centre of Grape street from Campbell street to Jay street, and north of a line drawn through the centre of Jay street from Grape street to the Erie canal.

Ward 12.—Beginning at a point where the centre line of Howell street continued westward intersects with the centre of Genesee river; thence running easterly along the centre line of Howell street continued to the centre of the Erie canal; thence along the centre of the Erie canal to the eastern boundary of the city; thence southerly and westerly along the boundary* of the city to the centre of the Genesee river; thence along the centre of the Genesee river to the place of beginning.

Election District, No. 1, comprises all that part of the ward lying north of a line drawn through the centre of Gregory and Grand streets.

Election District, No. 2, comprises all that part of the ward lying south of a line drawn through the centre of Gregory and Grand streets.

Ward 13.—Beginning at a point in the centre of North street and of the New York Central Railroad track; running thence westerly along the centre of the New York Central Railroad track to a point in a line with the centre of Nassau street; thence easterly along the centre of Nassau street, and in a direct line continued to the centre of Clinton street; thence northerly along the centre of Clinton street to the north boundary line* of the city; thence easterly along the boundary line of the city to the centre of North street; thence southerly along the centre of North street to the place of beginning.

Election District, No. 1, comprises all that part of the ward lying west of a line drawn through the centre of Chatham from Hamburg street to Kelly street; north of a line drawn through the centre of Kelly street from Chatham street to Hanover street; west of a line drawn through the centre of Hanover street; north of a line drawn through the centre of Herman street from Hanover street to Thomas street; west of a line drawn through the centre of Thomas street.

Election District, No. 2, comprises all that part of the ward lying east of a line drawn through the centre of Chatham street from Hamburg street to Kelly street; south of a line drawn through the centre of Kelly street from Chatham street to Hanover street; east of a line drawn through the centre of Hanover street; south of a line drawn through the centre of Herman street from Hanover street to Thomas street; east of a line drawn through the centre of Thomas street.

Ward 14.—Beginning at a point in the centre of East Main and of North streets; thence running northerly along the centre of North street to the boundary line*; thence easterly and southerly along the boundary line of the city to a point which would be intersected by continuing the centre line of Scio street northerly; thence southerly through the centre of Scio street to the centre of East Main street; thence westerly along the centre of East Main street to the place of beginning.

Ward 15.—All that part of the city lying west of the centre of the Genesee river and not included in either of the above described fifteen wards. (*See City Boundaries, page 498*).

Ward 16.—All that part of the city lying east of the centre of the Genesee river and not included in either of the above described fourteen wards. (*See City Boundaries, page 498*).

Election District, No. 1, comprises all that part of the ward lying west of a line drawn through the centre of North avenue.

Election District, No. 2, comprises all that part of the ward lying east of a line drawn through the centre of North av. and north of the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. track.

Election District, No. 3, comprises all that part of the ward lying south of the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. track.

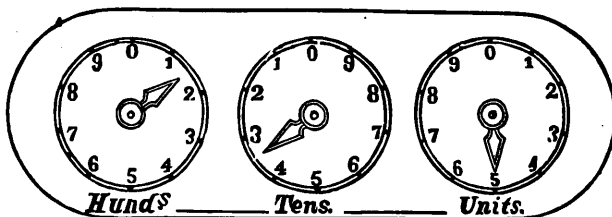

TO CONSUMERS.


The following explanations will enable any person to understand the process of ascertaining the Registry of the Gas Meter, and by making observations every day, or at short intervals, to satisfy himself that the meter registers with uniform accuracy the amount of gas that passes through it. The following diagrams show the "Indexes" seen on the front of every meter.

EXPLANATION OF INDEX.



The figure or division on the different faces of the index indicates as follows, viz: On the Right Hand Face, *Hundreds*, as 100, 200, 300 cubic feet, &c.; on the Middle Face, *Thousands*, as 1,000, 2,000, 3,000 cubic feet, &c.; on the Left Hand Face, *Tens of Thousands*, as 10,000, 20,000, &c., and in this way multiplying by 10 for every additional face.

TO TELL THE STATE OF THE METER.—Look at the *left hand* face of the Index and set down the figure of *least* value next the hand, which on the diagram is 1. Next look at the *middle* face, and as before set down the figure of the *least* value next the hand, which on the diagram is 3. Next upon the *right hand* face, take the same relative figure, which is 5, and you have the figures 1, 3, 5, to which last figure add two ciphers to represent hundreds, and the sum 13,500 is shown to be the present state of the meter. If a previous observation has been taken, subtract the state of the meter at *that* time from the *present* state, and you have the amount consumed in the interval.

 In case of the failure of the gas from any cause, immediate notice of the fact should be left at the Company's office.
