PRINTED MATTER. — 1 cent for each two ounces or fraction. Limit of weight, 4 lbs. 6 oz.

COMMERCIAL PAPERS (Insurance Documents, Way Bills, Invoices, Papers of Legal Procedure, Manuscripts of Works, &c.) — The same as for printed matter, but the lowest charge is 5 cents.

SAMPLES OF MERCHANDISE. — The rate is the same as for printed matter, but the lowest charge is 2 cents. Limit of weight 8 $\frac{3}{4}$ oz., except to Great Britain and Colonies, France, Belgium, Switzerland, Italy, Egypt, Austria-Hungary, Hawaii, and Argentine Republic, to which countries the limit of weight is 12 oz.

To Canada, comprising *British Columbia, Manitoba, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia,* and *Prince Edward Island,* the postage for letters, printed matter, merchandise, etc., is the same as in the United States. All matter for Canada must be fully prepaid, except letters, which must be prepaid at least 2 cents.

Parcels to Jamaica, British Honduras, Bahamas, Mexico, Colombia, Salvador, Costa Rica, Hawaiian Islands, Leeward Islands, Barbadoes, Danish West Indies, Windward Islands, British Guiana and Newfoundland, not exceeding one pound, 12 cents; each additional pound or fraction, 12 cents.

To Mexico, postage is the same as in the United States, except upon parcels as above. All mail matter may be registered to the above places.

SOME REASONS WHY NAMES ARE NOT FOUND IN THE DIRECTORY.

Many persons fail to find names on account of not knowing where to look for them. A slight variation in spelling will place names almost exactly alike, far apart. For instance—such names as Brown, Browne, Braun, though pronounced the same, and really the same name, are found in different places in the Directory. So, also, of Conner, Connor, Connors, O'Connor, and many others, each has its own place.

The pronunciation of foreign names usually varies from the pronunciation of such names in English. For instance—if an Irishman pronounces his name Agan, it is probably spelled Eagan or Egan. So, Mar, spelled Meagher or Mahr; Fay, spelled Fahy, etc. In names of nearly all European languages, the sounds of the vowels are usually as follows:—a is ah, e is e, i is ee, o is oo, u is oo.

In German names, ei and ai are pronounced like f, ie like s, au like ow, eu like oi; j is pronounced like y, w nearly like v, dt and th like t, etc. Thus, a name which is pronounced Yack, may be spelled Jack; Young, Jonge; Roiter, Reuter; Keefer, Kiefer; Line, Lein; and they must be looked for as spelled, not as pronounced.

The letters á, ô, ù, in a German name, are equivalent to ae, oe, ue, and the name *should be looked for* as if the e appeared.

Owing to the difficulty which foreigners find in getting their names properly pronounced by the Americans with whom they come in contact, they frequently make very decided changes in them; taking sometimes an English name which sounds similar to theirs—as Gilbert for Gebhardt, Rice for Reis, Cole for Kohl, etc.; sometimes translating their names, as Blanc changed to White, Stein to Stone, etc.

Sometimes, members of the same family spell their names in two or three different ways; as Ballantyne, Ballantine, Ballintine; sometimes men bear two or three names, being known by one in their family, another in the shop, and perhaps still another among their associates.

To find a name, you *must know how to spell it.*

WATER WORKS DEPARTMENT.

The original **Water Works** were begun in July, 1873, and completed in February, 1876. They embrace two distinct systems of water distribution from two separate sources. The first or principal one is the **gravity system from Hemlock Lake** as source, which now includes two conduits and 237.90 miles of distributing pipe; the second is the **Holly System**, which derives its supply from the Genesee River and serves essentially in affording a more efficient fire protection in the central and manufacturing districts of the city, the extent of distributing pipe connected therewith being 18.42 miles on April 1, 1895. Total length of distributing pipes, in city, of both systems, 256.32 miles.

The **original conduit** consists of 9.80 miles of 36-inch and 2.57 miles of 24-inch wrought-iron riveted pipe, and 15.90 miles of 24-inch cast-iron pipe; total length of old conduit is 28.27 miles.

The **new conduit** consists of 2.22 miles of brick conduit 6 feet in diameter, and 25.94 miles of 38-inch riveted steel pipe, with 0.25 miles of 36-inch cast-iron pipe; total length of new conduit, 28.41 miles; total length of conduits and distributing pipes April 1, 1895, 313.00 miles.

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THE CIVIL SERVICE.

For State Board of Commissioners, see page 923.

By enactment of the legislature, all positions in the public service of Rochester (excepting those filled by public election, the heads of departments, and positions under the city treasurer, or the Board of Education), must be filled from applicants who have successfully passed an examination by a board of civil service examiners.

Two Boards, consisting of three members each, are appointed by the mayor, and not more than two members can be of the same political party.

Whenever a position is to be filled, the examining board will notify the applicants on record, or such number of them as can be conveniently examined, to appear for examination, and appointments must be made by the appointing power from the three on the list of the highest standing. Soldiers or sailors serving in the war of the rebellion, having any standing on the list, and otherwise equally competent, have the preference. The civil service does not affect removals from office. The civil service is classified as follows:

Schedule B, Part 1. Includes all officers and members of the Police and Fire Departments.

Schedule B, Part 2. Includes subordinate officers, clerks, and assistants not included in Part 1.

Laborers and day workmen are not subject to examination.

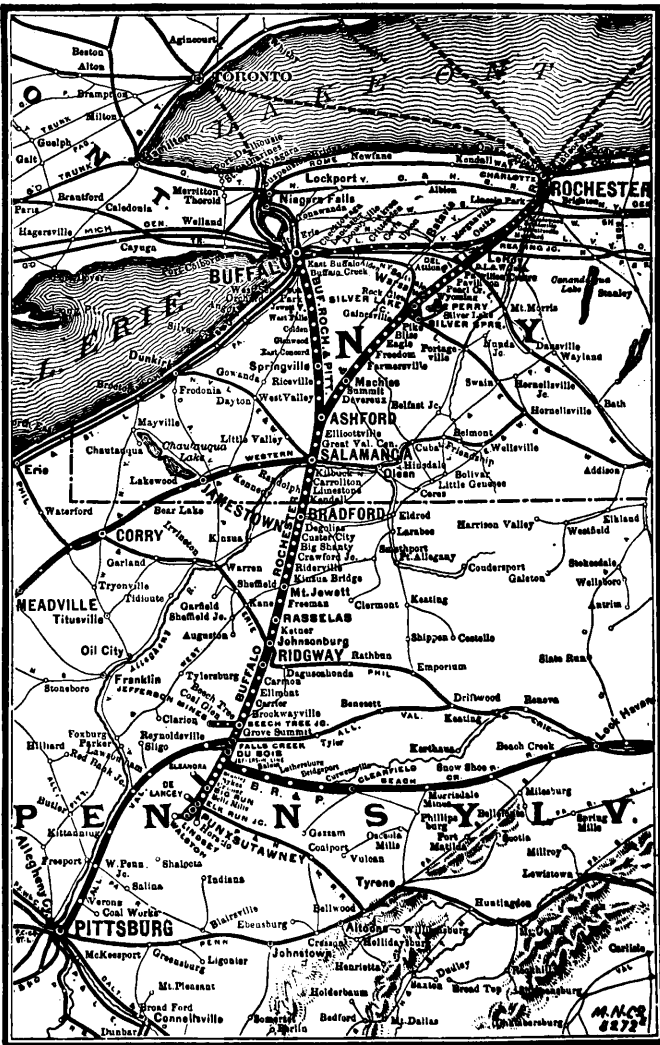
