Earth has been destroyed by a comet, and only a few hundred scientists and their children including Petra and her family – have been chosen to journey to a new planet.




The Outlaws Scarlett & Browne by Jonathan Stroud

This middle grade debut is *Sleeping Beauty* like you've never seen it before, about a girl who lives in the shadow of her older sister and the curse that has haunted her from birth.




Too Bright to See by Kyle Lukoff

Would you make a deal with a magical tiger? This uplifting story brings Korean folklore to life as a girl goes on a quest to unlock the power of stories and save her grandmother.




Wink by Rob Harrell

The powerful story of a young girl with the courage to make her voice heard, set against the backdrop of a summertime mystery. Family, friendship, and the power to speak up!




Dust & Grim by Chuck Wendig


Ground Zero by Alan Gratz

Twins Jez and Jay have always been fascinated by the African American folk magic that has been the legacy of their family for generations, but now have to deal with school integration and racism in their community.




Show Me a Sign by Ann Clare LeZotte
