The real women of these stories may have been princesses and aristocracy, but they also led lives as independent rulers, schemers, spies, pirates, military leaders, and more. Read about the myths that surrounded them during their reigns, as well as the legacy each has left to history.

More than Petticoats: Remarkable New York Women (2001)

This book profiles twelve New York women, each born before 1900, who made significant contributions to society. The short chapters give a brief biography of each of these women and highlight their accomplishments.

Hidden Figures: The American Dream and the Untold Story of the Black Women Mathematicians Who Helped Win the Space Race (2016) Margot Lee Shetterly

The amazing true story of the black female mathematicians at NASA, whose efforts helped America achieve great success in space. The book starts during World War II, moves through to the Cold War, the Civil Rights Movement and the Space Race. The book details the lives of four African-American women during those times: Dorothy Vaughan, Mary Jackson, Katherine Johnson and Christine Darden. Their true stories will inspire readers and shed light on a little known chapter of American history.

Headstrong: 52 Women Who Changed Science – and the World (2015)



Americanah (2014)

Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie

Ifemelu and Obinze are young lovers in military-ruled Nigeria. Both leave for the west–Ifemelu for American where, for the first time, she is forced to confront what it means to be black. Obinze had hoped to join her, but with post-9/11 America closed to him, he instead plunges into a dangerous, undocumented life in London.

Difficult Women (2017)

Roxane Gay

Difficult Women is a collection of 21 fictional short stories so sad, beautiful, disturbing and complex that they will be impossible to get out of your head. Pick this one up if you enjoy reading about the experiences of imperfect women.

Lilac Girls (2016)

Martha Hall Kelly

Inspired by the life of a real World War II heroine, this debut novel reveals the power of unsung women to change history. Told in the alternating perspectives of Caroline Ferriday, Kasia Kuzmerik and Herta Oberheuser you will see what happens when they cross paths and fight the atrocities at the Ravensbruck Concentration camp.

Crossing the Horizon (2016) Laurie Notaro

Hang on for one of aviation history's wildest rides, replete with laughs, in this story based on the lives of Elsie Mackay, Mabel Boll, and Ruth Elder, as these determined women race to be the first to make a transatlantic flight.

Girl Waits with Gun (2016) Amy Stewart

This ripped-from-the-headlines story is a fictional account of the events that inspired one of America's first female deputy sheriffs to pursue a career in police work. After their buggy is destroyed by a car belonging to a powerful factory owner, Constance and her sisters find themselves caught up with mobsters who are willing to do whatever it takes to silence them. Constance goes to great lengths to protect her sisters and their farm, not afraid to break

societal expectations for women in 1914. Also check out the second book in the series, *Lady Cop Makes Trouble*.



Courageous Women of the Civil War: Soldiers, Spies, Medics, and More (2016) M.R. Cordell

This short book offers an overview of the Civil War while profiling several surprising women who participated as soldiers, spies, nurses, and vivandières.

Thinking In Pictures and Other Reports from My Life with Autism (1995)

Temple Grandin, Ph. D.

Temple Grandin is a woman who experiences the world from the vantage point of someone on the autism spectrum. It influences how she thinks, feels and comprehends everything and everyone around her. Temple shares her extraordinary story with us, while her perspective helps us understand this different world.

Sisters in Law: How Sandra Day O'Connor and Ruth Bader Ginsburg Went to the Supreme Court and Changed the World (2016) Linda Hirshma

An informative dual biography on the first two women appointed to the Supreme Court. The book examines the contrasting lives of Sandra Day O'Connor and Ruther Bader Ginsburg and how they shaped women's issues and the legal system.
