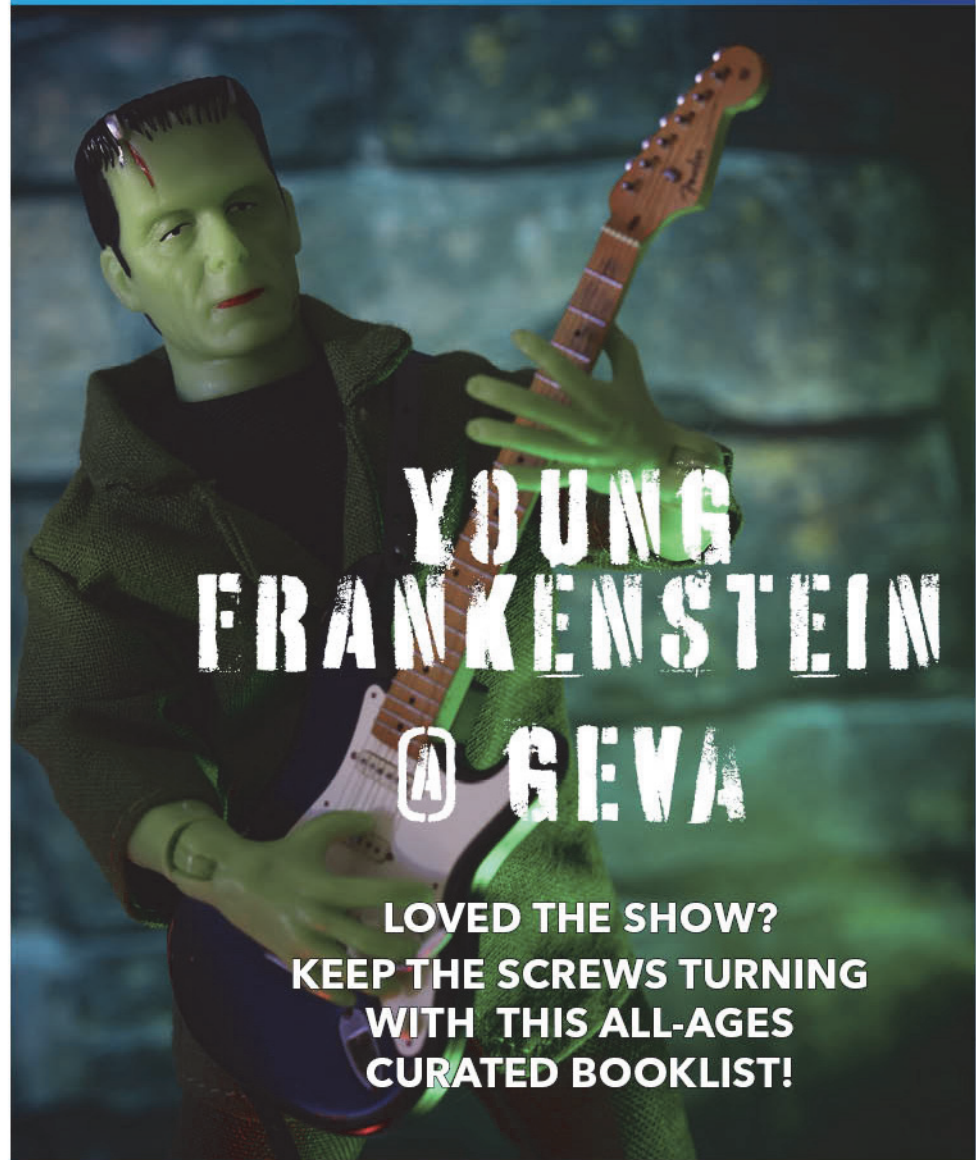

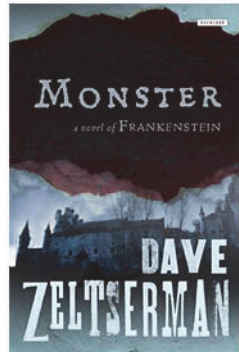
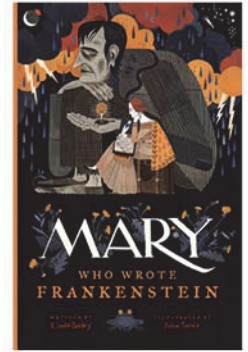

Monster: A Novel of Frankenstein (2012)

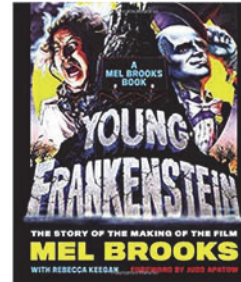

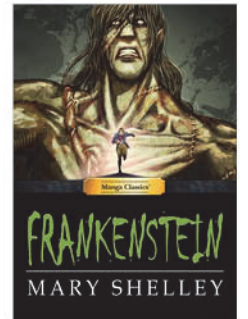

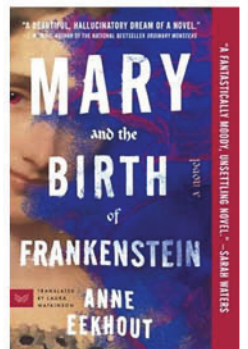

Gris Grimly's Frankenstein (2006)

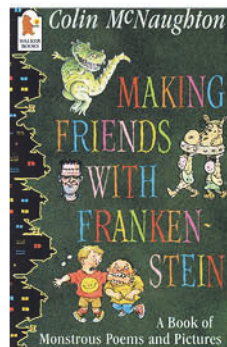
By Grimly, Gris

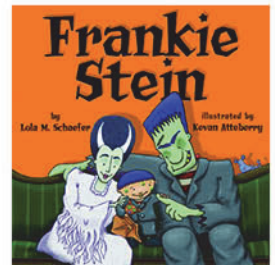


Frankenstein Makes a Sandwich (2006)

Bernie Wrightson's Frankenstein is an illustrated edition of Mary Shelley's 1818 novel *Frankenstein; or, The Modern Prometheus*, first published in 1983 by Marvel Comics, with full-page illustrations by Bernie Wrightson. In 2008, a new edition was released by Dark Horse Comics for the 25th anniversary. *Adult nonfiction*
